Introduction

 Breastfeeding is important for both infant and maternal health

Objective

• To identify the current level of support for breastfeeding parents during their child's hospitalization at UC Davis Children's Hospital

Methods

 Conducted semistructured interviews with breastfeeding parents during or following their child's hospitalization

Difficulty Feeding at the Breast

"...my daughter had all these lines in her so that couldn't really be moved, I couldn't really hold her correctly..."

Lack of Privacy

"It was very difficult to find any private place to pump...l couldn't use the bathroom inside the room because it was shared with another patient next door."

Pumping Challenges

"It was difficult to get equipment...And it seems like I was switching one pump with other women...to have to bother the nurses, to have them get the pump for me every 4 hours...it's not feasible."

Difficulty Accessing a Lactation Consultant

"...she said that she could get a lactation consultant and I was really hopeful for that. But then...nobody was able to come so... I kind of had to just Google what to do and fix the problem myself."
