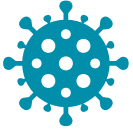


Human Papillomavirus:

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) is a very common virus



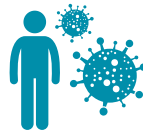
85% of people will get an HPV infection in their lifetime



HPV increases cancer risk for:

6 types of cancer

- Cervical
- Vulva
- Vaginal
- Penile
- Anal
- Oropharynx



Symptoms might take years to develop but a person is **still contagious**


90%

HPV vaccination prevents more than **90%** of cancers caused by HPV



HPV VACCINATION IS CANCER PREVENTION

When to Vaccinate?

| Age at Shot #1 | # of shots | Shot #2 | Shot #3 |
|----------------|---|----------------------|--|
| 9–14 years | 2 shots  | 6–12 months after #1 | Not needed  |
| 15–26 years | 3 shots  | 1–2 months after #1 | 6 months after #1 |
