

# Penicillin Allergy 101

10% OF THE US POPULATION REPORTS A PENICILLIN ALLERGY, BUT **ONLY 1%** ARE ACTUALLY ALLERGIC!



# A penicillin allergy label is a big deal!

Associated with:

- More side effects and secondary infections
- Higher rates of antibiotic resistance
- Longer hospital stays
- · Higher healthcare costs

### Common reasons for (mis)labeling:

- Viral or benign rashes (nonurticarial or eczematous)
- Mild side effects (isolated headache, nausea, diarrhea)
- Misconception that family history is associated with increased risk of penicillin allergy

## How a drug allergy actually presents:

- Immediate reactivity (within the first few doses of medication)
- · History of prior exposure to a penicillin-based medication
- Urticarial rash (found in 90% of reactions)
- Complete resolution of symptoms within 24-48 hours of stopping medication
- Other system involvement (respiratory or GI distress)

### Consider the history before you label!

When in doubt, refer to an allergist to help sort things out!
