Her clinical, teaching, and research interests include: the impact of early adversity on child development, interventions for complex trauma disorders in children and families, training psychologists in developing basic competence in treating psychological trauma, providing services to fostered and adopted children, comprehensive treatment for survivors of human trafficking, incorporating culture and diversity into therapeutic practice, international issues in mental health, and therapeutic assessment. Dr. Long has received specialized training and supervision in several evidence-based practices including Child-Parent Psychotherapy, Trauma-Focused CBT, Parent-Child Interaction Therapy, Incredible Years, and Seeking Safety, and she is passionate about working with children and families whose circumstances have made it difficult to access high quality mental health care.
