
LGBT FIREARM OWNERSHIP IN CALIFORNIA








An estimated 129,200 LGBT California adults (8% of LGBT adults in the state) personally own a gun, and an additional 8% live in a home with someone else who does.




By contrast, **4.2 million** (14%) **of all adults** in the state **own a gun**, and an additional 11% do not own, but live in a household with an owner.

MOST LGBT CALIFORNIANS OWN A SINGLE FIREARM. USUALLY A HANDGUN.



SELF-PROTECTIVE OWNERSHIP AND CARRYING ARE MORE COMMON AMONG LGBT GUN OWNERS THAN OWNERS IN THE GENERAL POPULATION.





Over half of California's LGBT owners acquired their most recent firearm by purchase, usually from a gun or sporting goods store.

In California, nearly all firearm sales, including private party sales, require a background check.





Ownership by Gender, Sexual Orientation, Age, and Race/Ethnicity


What we learned:



Non-owners were 50% cis male, 2% trans male, 42% cis female, 4% trans female, and 1% other gender identity

CSaWS

The California Safety and Wellbeing Survey (CSaWS) is a statewide, probability-based Internet survey developed by UCFC and administered by Ipsos Public Affairs, LLC in late 2018. CSaWS asked questions on a wide range of topics related to firearm ownership and exposure to violence and its consequences. A total of 806 LGBT California adults completed CSaWS, and their answers are weighted to be statistically representative of the adult LGBT population of the state.

Funding for CSaWS comes from the State of California.

16% LGBT adults personally own (8%) or live with a gunowner (8%).

Over 3 in 4 LGBT owners own a single firearm, typically a handgun.

7 in 10 LGBT owners identified protection against people as the primary reason for ownership. Just under 1 in 3 reported carrying a loaded handgun in the prior month.

LGBT populations may experience disproportionate risk for violent injury, suicide in particular. Efforts to prevent firearm injury among LGBT owners should address selfprotection as the primary driver of ownership and carrying, and violence and suicide risks associated with ownership.
